## First Aid in school

At Tavistock College we have two trained 'first-aiders' on call should students have accidents or are suddenly taken ill. The college does not have trained medical practitioners who can diagnose conditions or treat them. Appointments should be made with a qualified doctor or nurse practitioner at a health clinic if an illness occurs.



Students should only attend ask to see a 'first-aider' in the Central Admin Base if:

- 1. They become unwell in the school day (eg are vomiting, have a severe headache). A contact will be made with parents and a decision can be made if it is appropriate for the student should go home.
- 2. They have an accident or an emergency occurs (eg. bleeding nose, a slip or fall). A call will be made with parents and an ambulance will be called if appropriate.
- 3. They take regular medication and this has been stored with parents' permission for administration.

The school nurse works in a number of different schools. The school nurse for Tavistock College is available on Monday lunchtimes in the Phoenix Suite. Her name is Nicky Freer and she operates a drop-in service for students who wish to discuss health related issues connected to physical, mental or emotional health. She can sign-post students to medical practitioners.

Dear Parent / Carers

Along with up to 3000 Headteacher colleagues across 14 counties I am writing to you in order to raise the issue of school funding and the significant current financial difficulties that all of our schools are now facing.

During all of our campaigning work to improve funding for each and every child in each and every school, we have been careful not to become involved in a politically biased or partisan way. Headteacher colleagues and I feel that ahead of the forthcoming general election it is crucial that parents, carers and all other interested parties raise the issue of school funding 'on the doorstep' with all prospective candidates.

It would be naïve to think that school funding is the only issue affecting everyone's lives but school finances are in such a dreadful state that we believe that it is vital to urge you to raise it as a key issue prior to 8 June.

As professionals we are only interested in securing fair and adequate funding for the children that we educate. This is under severe threat and has influenced our decision to contact you in a collaborative manner.

We hope that you will find the attached guide to be of use and make educational funding a cornerstone of the election campaign. The suggested questions could be put to any prospective parliamentary candidate so that we can all be fully informed as to the future of school funding in the very near future.

## **Education on the Doorstep**

A straightforward guide for parents and carers to understand the key issues of fair and improved funding for our schools.

#### The Issues

- £3 billion is being withdrawn from schools budgets in England
- In real terms, per pupil funding is decreasing by approximately 8%
- Pupil numbers are also increasing significantly
- Recruiting teachers for specialist subjects such as Maths, English, Science and Computer Science is becoming increasingly difficult.
- Some schools have been asking parents for additional financial contributions.

#### The Effects

- Without adequate funding schools can't employ enough high quality teachers. Some schools are having to make teachers redundant because they can no longer afford to employ them.
- Schools are also having to make support staff redundant. These staff often work with children with additional needs. In the years ahead there is a great deal of concern that some of our most vulnerable children will not receive the support they need.
- Class sizes are increasing. This is worrying because children are less likely to get the personal attention they need from a teacher who knows them well.
- Some schools are reducing the number of subjects they teach. This means the curriculum is narrowing and individual talents can't be nurtured in the way of previous generations.
- Many of the extra, wider curriculum experiences are being reduced either because the school can't subsidise them or increased workload for staff mans it is not reasonable to ask them to keep doing more.
- Some schools are struggling with poorly maintained classrooms and buildings and in some cases unresolved health and safety issues.

#### The questions for ALL prospective candidates for Members of Parliament

- What are your priorities with regard to the allocation of funding to all schools and each pupil?
- How will you ensure that school budgets are protected in real terms for the duration of the next parliament? Please avoid telling me that more is being spent on schools; we have more children of school age than ever and costs are rising.
- Some schools are looking to create classes of 60-100 children in the school hall because they cannot afford enough teachers. What are you going to do to prevent that?
- Our children should be provided with a broad curriculum, great support and enriching activities. How will you ensure that my child has the educational experience they deserve?
- How will you ensure education for children with Special Educational Needs is adequately resourced? A large funding gap in this area is detracting much needed funds from all schools.

## **Fidget Spinners**

The recent craze for fidget spinners has I am sure been noticed by all parents and teachers alike. They have undoubtedly started to become a distraction in lesson time with the spinners affecting student concentration and application to their work and being a drain on teachers' time in dealing with them. They are essentially a toy, and have started to be marketed in a very aggressive way and importantly we are concerned about the distraction they hold for other students in the room. We recognise that there are a few students across the College who benefit from such a device in aiding their concentration as part of a specific learning need. As a result they will have specific permission from their Head of Year and the SEND team regarding their access to a spinner. For the majority of students these spinners are now banned and teachers will ask for them to be put away in line with the behaviour policy and students that don't comply with this direction will have the spinner confiscated. There are of course many other alternative aids to helping student concentration such as having a doodle book which won't provide any distraction to other students. We ask that parents are supportive of this decision and encourage students not to bring them into college.

#### Catering

Catering staff encourage students to try new dishes and are happy for them to 'have a taste' before they buy.
