As a College, we spend lots of time reflecting on how we can best instil our pupils with a lifelong love of learning, while also preparing them to do their best in final examinations. As an English teacher, you won't be surprised to hear that I dedicate



much of my efforts towards boosting pupils' literacy levels. If we are successful in our efforts to hook students into reading quality fiction and non-fiction, they will not only improve their vocabulary, but will also better understand the world around them.

I recently read the latest report by the National Literacy Trust, which made clear that when students enjoy reading, they do much better at school, at work and beyond. The report found that the longer children continue to enjoy reading, the greater the benefits. Across the country, ten-year-old book-lovers had a reading age 1.3 years ahead of their classmates who dislike reading, and by age 14 this gap widened to 3.3 years. Significantly, these effects are also seen in subjects such as mathematics, a subject not always directly associated with textual comprehension. But with around half of secondary students in Britain still not enjoying reading, there is clearly much work to be done. In addition to the library lessons that form part of the KS3 English curriculum at Tavistock College, and opportunities to read during tutor time, reluctant readers would really benefit from reading for around 30 minutes per day at home. With this in mind, I've included an introductory reading list for younger pupils, along with some websites that will help pupils with their English knowledge in Years 7, 8 and 9. I will attach a KS4 and KS5 reading list in a future edition of the Parent Focus. Please do let me know if you have any questions or comments about the list or reading in general. 

# Do you need financial help to support your education?

The Tavistock College Endowment Fund is a registered charity set up in 1932. Its purpose is to help pupils of the College with the expenses of education.

Grants can be awarded:-

- To support education costs.
- To provide assistance with clothing, tools and instruments on leaving school.
- To fund travel abroad to pursue education.
- To provide facilities for recreation and social or physical training.
- To provide financial assistance to study music or other arts.

### Eligibility

Young people under the age of 25 who are attending the college or have attended at any time for not less than 3 years and are resident in either the urban or rural areas of Tavistock (In the opinion of the trustees).

The trustees meet in **January May and October** each year to determine applications. Application forms are available from the Principal's office or can be downloaded from the college website. http://www.tavistockcollege.org/our-college/tavistockcollege-endowment-fund/

Applicants should provide **as much detail as possible** regarding family income and reasons why funding is required.

Students should note that Trustees rarely fund the whole cost of a school trip or project .They expect the student or their family to raise funds or contribute towards the cost. **Please supply as much detail as you can when applying for a grant.**
