This is on the back of well over 100 visitors to recent open mornings where parents have witnessed the college at work during a typical school day. First Aid in school

At Tavistock College we have trained 'first-aiders' on call should students have accidents or are suddenly taken ill. The college does not have trained medical practitioners who can diagnose conditions or treat them. Appointments should be made with a qualified



doctor or nurse practitioner at a health clinic if an illness occurs.

Students should only ask to see a 'first-aider' in the Central Admin Base if:

- They become unwell in the school day (eg are vomiting, have a severe headache). Contact will be made with parents and a decision can be made if it is appropriate for the student to go home.
- They have an accident or an emergency occurs (eg. bleeding nose, a slip or fall). A call will be made with parents and an ambulance will be called if appropriate.
- They take regular medication and this has been stored with parents' permission for administration.

Thank you for considering these expectations, which if we all adhere to the College services will be able to function in a smoother and more efficient manner.

Members of Devon and Cornwall Police spoke at length about the law behind drugs, crypto-currency and the dangers of the dark web. Y-Smart also provided a valuable input on how we as a local community can work together both in school and outside to spot the warning signs in our young people and to best support and educate them if they become involved in using an illegal substance.

Parental feedback has been so positive that we are in the process of confirming a follow up event where Detective Constable Jason Braund will speak again on the dangers of drugs for young people. He works in the Serious and Organised Crime Branch of Devon and Cornwall Police and is an expert in the dangers of and misuse of drugs amongst young people.
