The Truth About the Budget This week Chancellor Philip Hammond delivered a new

budget in Parliament.

Here's what you need to know about this budget:

- 1. There's no money for core school budgets There is no money whatsoever to plug the gap in core school budgets. Instead 17,942 schools faced cuts yesterday and 17,942 schools continue to face cuts today. This means there is no way to reduce class sizes and to provide support for vulnerable children.
- 2. There's nothing for SEND

Children with special educational needs and disabilities need urgent education funding, more than 2,000 children are still awaiting appropriate provision. But there was no attempt by the Government to address the crisis in SEND.

3. Only "little extras" for school buildings and equipment were announced

The Chancellor announced one-off funding for "little extras". This school capital budget was down by £2.6 billion compared to 2010. With Hammond's little extras, it will still be down by £2.1 billion. This simply doesn't cut it when our schools are in disrepair after years of cuts.

This was the Government's opportunity to change course and properly fund the schools our children deserve. Instead the Government has failed children once again. There has been no attempt to redress the paucity of funding for schools.

The campaign against school cuts is still in place, and head teachers across Devon have pledged to continue to fight to improve the situation we all find ourselves in. We need your support as parents: many voices have a greater effect than a few.

2018 Cambridge University Aspire

Residential Trip for Year 10

On September 13th and 14th we were delighted to be part of the group of seventeen year 10 students who had the opportunity to visit Downing College on the Cambridge University Aspire Trip with Mr Galli, Mr Chambers and Ms Cocker. We left College at 6.30am and arrived at Downing College at 2.00pm where we were met by Ms Jess Lister, the south-west School and College Liaison Officer. She had organised a comprehensive and informative programme and began by giving us detailed information about applying to Cambridge discussing such aspects as the application process and the importance of the personal statement and how the interview process works. We really appreciated the insight she gave us into life at Cambridge and the in-depth analysis about the courses offered and the type of student Cambridge is looking for. In this sense the trip was a really valuable and interesting experience for all of us.



Then we had a tour of Downing College including the JCR (Junior Common Room) and the beautiful gardens followed by a walk around Cambridge taking all the famous places and sights. We learned that Downing College was founded by Sir George Downing, third Baronet, with wealth left by his grandfather, who served Cromwell and Charles II as well as building 10 Downing Street, the London home of the Prime Minister. We were also particularly interested to hear that in 1893 Tchaikovsky stayed with F W Maitland in the West Lodge in Downing while in Cambridge for a concert to mark the 50th anniversary of the Cambridge University Musical Society (CUMS).

We had the chance to enjoy dinner in the splendour of the College dining hall which gave us a feel of being in a traditional College surrounded by all its history and then spend a night in undergraduate accommodation with each of us having our own room. After dinner we had a wonderful experience being chauffeured down the River Cam past the famous 'College Backs' on a punting tour while the sun was setting. On Friday morning, after breakfast, we took part in two academic sessions to show us what



a typical seminar would be like and these gave us the chance to hone our critical thinking and debating skills. Jess then answered our questions regarding course funding, accommodation, clubs, support for academic studies and how students contribute to College life. After the final Q



& A we were given an enjoyable tour of Emmanuel College including the outdoor swimming pool and had some free time in Cambridge city centre.

We left Cambridge at 11.30am arriving back at the College at 6.30pm after a very enjoyable and successful trip summed up by some of the student comments below:
