First Aid at the College

We take the care and well- being of every child and young person here at the college extremely seriously. It matters hugely that all children are given the best and most professional support and care that we can muster. However, there is currently something of a disparity between expectations and capacity in terms of; "first aid", here at Tavistock.

We are absolutely obliged to provide "first aid" for all college members and we have a small team of appropriately trained and skilled colleagues here who do just that. We cannot, and do not however, provide any accident and emergency services or primary/crisis medical care on site. We have no full time "school nurse" available and although our externally commissioned school nursing colleague visits twice a month for six hours in total, her remit does not include providing crisis medical care.

If a child is ill before they leave their home and they are unfit for school, please do not send them in as we have no clinically trained staff or here to take care of them. Attendance in these circumstances also, in some cases, puts other children and young people at risk of contracting contagious conditions which, as we are sure you can appreciate, is a situation we wish to avoid. Similarly, if a child or young person becomes unwell, we are unable to diagnose illnesses and prescribe a treatment plan. In these instances the child in question will need to be taken, by a parent/guardian, to see a suitably qualified professional. Although fortunately a very rare occurrence, should any young person have an accident whilst on the school premises or in the care of the school, and be injured beyond the remit of pure first aid, either a paramedic or ambulance may need to be summoned and/ or you may be telephoned and asked to take your charge to the local A&E/medical facility. Please ensure that we have your current telephone contact details if you have not already done so.

Our first aiders are not prescribers or dispensers and we do not for obvious reasons carry stocks of medication. Should any child or young person require prescribed medication we refer you to the relevant policy on the college website http://www.tavistockcollege.org/wp-content/uploads/2018/05/Supporting-students-with-Medical-Conditions.pdf

Please also be aware that there is no school based counselling service at Tavistock College. We do have one part time well- being worker who supports students to the best of their ability with emotional health and well- being but this is not a form of counselling. The Phoenix Project

PLYMOUTH LIVE - RACHAEL ATKINS - 5 MARCH 2019 The Phoenix Project, founded by Devon and Somerset Fire and Rescue Service, is a week-long course which shows voungsters the services that Fire and Rescue teams deliver.

Young people have been learning first-hand the importance of fire and rescue skills thanks to a joint project between West Devon Borough Council and Devon and Somerset Fire and Rescue Service.

The Phoenix Project, founded by Devon and Somerset Fire and Rescue Service, is a week-long course which shows youngsters the services that Fire and Rescue teams deliver to residents.



The course was completed at the end of February at Tavistock Fire Station and included 12 students aged between 12 and 14 years old taking part from Tavistock and Okehampton Colleges. The students were taught important life skills such as respect, team building, first aid and trust, as well as important fire and home safety awareness.

The scheme is designed to help teenagers who may require some extra support. It aims to boost their confidence and selfesteem by encouraging them to participate in fun and challenging exercises.

Ross Corkell, Assistant Head of Year 9, Tavistock College, said: "The pupils at Tavistock College have always benefited from the skills that are nurtured on the Phoenix project. This year is no different and the impact on these pupils as individuals is one of building a confidence to succeed and of improving their working relationship and respect of others. The college fully support this opportunity and will look to continue to do so in the future."

Students were mentored by senior fire and rescue officers. This helps to build respect for uniformed officers and the responsibilities they hold. The enthusiastic pupils also learned how to use specialist breathing apparatus.

The week finished with an exciting passing out parade, where the youngsters showed proud friends, families and teachers what they had learned throughout the course. This included demonstrations where they worked together to take part in practice sessions of hosing down a vehicle in the event of an engine fire, hosing down a building and running the hoses from the fire

At the end of the drills, the Mayor presented the youngsters with certificates of achievement.


