How the subject will be taught:

History is taught in a variety of ways – including 'flip learning' –which is finding out about an issue or topic before a lesson and then doing something interesting in the lesson with the information – either a discussion or something more active.

There is a lot of note taking (outside the lessons usually) to gather knowledge.

\$ome lessons include peer presentations which are shared – along with the notes.

Factual quiz tests are used after each mini section to avoid panic revision at the end of whole units. Assessment tests are also part of the learning and detailed feedback is given along with model answers to help improve essential exam skills.
