Mobile Phone Policy

Thank you to all parents and families for supporting the College with the new mobile phone policy in the last week. Inevitably some students have fallen foul of the new tighter rules and harsher sanctions and I am sure that those students who have had a device confiscated will have learned a very valuable lesson. As previously mentioned the rules are very clear and transparent whilst still enabling teachers to allow students to utilise technology in their lessons at the right time and to enjoy their phones for personal use in their social time at break and lunch. Many students and staff I have spoken to this week have remarked on the positive change which helps them to concentrate on the learning and knowledge acquisition which after all is the core business of the school. The key rules are summarised below again for your convenience:

- Mobile phones may not be used for personal use in lesson time and tutor time.
- Mobile phones may not be used for personal use between lesson time and tutor time.
- Headphones must not be seen during the school day, except in social time at break and lunch.

• Mobile phone chargers must not be brought into, or used in school. Misusing mobile phones, chargers or headphones will result in immediate confiscation from students, the equipment being stored securely and only given back to parents/ carers via the main reception at the end of the day.

Community Engagement

A small group of Y8 students are currently working on the Guildhall Gateway project which aims to explore the history of the Tavistock Guildhall and the people who worked there. Students will be interviewing ex police officers and other professionals, including one of the first female PCs as well as exploring the theme of crime and punishment more widely. Students will be working alongside a BBC sound engineer to create a sound piece that will include the stories of police people and others who have helped shape the wider Tavistock community.

Founders' Day

This week we took 240 Y8 students to our annual Founders' Day service. This important day in the school year allows us to celebrate the history of Tavistock College and remember the role of our Founders'. The event also sees our new sixth form leadership team in the public eye for the first time. The 'Head Students' Darcy Brown and Luke Cressey recounted what Tavistock College used to be like and how education used to differ to that experienced by our current cohort of young people. The House Captains then explained where our House names originate from. This forms a really powerful message as the students hear how Edmund Tremayne, as a Member of Parliament represented the local community in our oldest of democratic institutions and how this is built on those same principles of democracy and solidarity that we share and try to cultivate with our students today. Similarly we heard



how John Russell, the first Earl of Bedford established the school in Tavistock and ensured the co-operative values of selfresponsibility and the principle of equity benefitted a community far wider than his immediate friends and family.

These formal church events always remind us how the college sits at the very centre of its community and how as the school of choice for the people that live here, we need to look back respectfully whilst continually moving forward.

The service culminated in the school making a donation to the Tavistock Food Bank and the great work their team of people do in providing help, support and solidarity to the local community.
