This information is within the issue and has also been sent to students via class charts and on social media platforms. We hope this will put your mind at rest in these unprecedented times.

Results days are GCSE Thursday 20th August and A-level Thursday 13th August. We all appreciate the importance of these days and that most students will be celebrating their success. We are working to make sure these days allow celebration and a chance to say goodbye as this opportunity was taken away. More information on these important days will follow.

Dear students and parents/carers

The Department for Education has recommended that Y10 and Y12 students should now be able to return to school for some face to face contact with teachers. It is possible that some of you may be worried or anxious about the prospect of coming back to school. Your education is very important, but it is not recommended that everyone in Y10 and Y12 comes back to school full time. This is why you will only be invited in for a limited time each week, and that you should continue with your on-line learning when not in school.

You will see from the top of the letter that you have been allocated a specific day of the week to attend and a room where you will stay for the day. Y10 will be taught in groups of no more than 5. They will be taught an hour of English, mathematics, science and PSHE. Some students will also have a study session based on their option subjects.

In order to maintain safety on the school site, there are some expectations you must be aware of when you come back to school. These must be adhered to at all times.

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- On arrival at school, students will queue outside the gates. Students will be expected to stay 2 metres apart. There are markers on the ground to help you.
- On entering the building, a member of staff will take your temperature via a handheld remote device. You will then be expected to apply hand sanitiser.
- Once inside the school you will be asked to follow a one-way system around the sitel and stay 2m apart from anyone else. You will see upon entering the school that there are signs and floor markings to guide you.
- Class sizes will be reduced to 5, unless you are in Y12 in the Hall or Innovation Centre. If any yr 12 needs to stay in school in between lessons, they will have their study room available to them but it will be restricted to how many students will be allowed in at any one time. Y10 students will be allocated a room for learning in, and they will stay in that room at one desk for all lessons.
- The teachers will move to classrooms to teach their subject. It is very unlikely that students will be taught by their regular teacher.
- Students should not be alarmed to see teachers wearing suitable PPE this is to protect the teacher and others. Students may wear face coverings if they wish.
- Breaks will be staggered to ensure social distancing measures can be followed. There will be no congregating or time allocated to spend with friends.
- Food will be available in the normal way but will be restricted. We would prefer students to bring a packed lunch.
- Students will be expected to wash hands regularly especially after visiting the toilet. Hand sanitiser is available in every classroom.
- Students should not wear school uniform. This follows Public Health England's advice that clothes should be washed every day to reduce the risk of transmission through the fabric. Clothes worn to school should be clean, comfortable and your body suitably covered
- We will provide students with the relevant stationary whilst they are in school so there is no need for anything to be brought in from home.
- Cleaning will take place twice a day.
- We expect all students to behave in a kind and considerate manner and follow protocol in these unprecedented times to keep themselves and others safe.

School Transport will also resume next week although it might be a different vehicle than the students are used to. In accordance with the government's guidance, we expect students to all wear suitable face coverings when travelling on school transport. Students must follow any instructions given to them by the bus drivers, particularly with regard to where they will be expected to sit.

Please do not attend or send your children to school if feeling unwell.. Students should follow the "catch it, bin it, kill it advice" from NHS England that includes coughing into the elbow, disposing of tissues and always washing hands immediately.

We appreciate that you may have many questions and we thank you in advance for your patience and understanding. We hope that recent communications with you over the last few weeks should have answered any questions you have, but as always, please let us know if you have any urgent concerns through office@tavistockcollege.org.
