Welcome to the latest issue of the weekly newsletter that aims to keep our communication lines open between home and college.

This edition covers information about returning to school for year 9, Diversity week, uniforms ready for transition, Devon Virtual Games, English Writing competitions and a year in review.

There has been some welcome news to businesses this week with the reduction of social distancing (one meter plus) and opening of some services to kick start our economy. We still need to stay alert and these services will need to follow additional guidelines and precautions to minimise the risk of transmission. In light of these changes we are planning and updating our risk assessment welcoming back year 9 on <u>Monday</u> <u>6th July</u>. They will follow the same procedures and expectations as the year 10 and 12 cohort a few weeks before them. The main difference being slightly larger class sizes (7 pupils) and more pupils on site. Year 9 Parents and carers who have signaled their intent to allow the son/ daughter back into College will be notified about which day they are to attend. They will follow a blend of subject specialist teaching and academic mentoring. I have included the letter you will receive that featured a few weeks back.

Dear students and parents/carers

The Department for Education has recommended that schools can now invite other students, in addition to Y10 and Y12 who have already been back at college, to return to school for some face to face contact with teachers. It is possible that some of you may be worried or anxious about the prospect of coming back to school. Your education is very important, but it is not recommended that everyone in Y9 comes back to school full time. This is why you will only be invited in for a limited time each week, and that you should continue with your on-line learning when not in school.

You will see from the top of the letter that you have been allocated a specific day of the week to attend and a room where you will stay for the day. This arrangement will commence from the week beginning Monday 6th July. Y9 will be taught in groups of no more than 7. They will be taught an hour of English, mathematics, science and PSHE. Some students will also have a study session based on their option subjects.

In order to maintain safety on the school site, there are some expectations you must be aware of when you come back to school. These must be adhered to at all times.



- On arrival at school, students will queue outside the gates. Staff will be on hand to direct and students will be expected to stay 2 metres apart. There are markers on the ground to help you.
- On entering the building, a member of staff will take your temperature via a handheld remote device. You will then be expected to apply hand sanitiser.
- Once inside the school you will be asked to follow a one-way system around the site and stay 2m apart from
 anyone else. You will see upon entering the school that there are signs and floor markings to guide you.
- Class sizes will be reduced to 7 and there will be no swapping or moving of students between classrooms. Y9
 students will be allocated a room for learning in, and they will stay in that room at one desk for all lessons.
- The teachers will move to classrooms to teach their subject. It is very unlikely that students will be taught by their regular teacher.
- Students should not be alarmed to see teachers wearing suitable PPE this is to protect the teacher and others.
 Students may wear face coverings if they wish.
- Breaks will be staggered to ensure social distancing measures can be followed. There will be no congregating or time allocated to spend with friends.
- Food will be available in the normal way but will be restricted. We would prefer students to bring a packed lunch.
- Students will be expected to wash hands regularly especially after visiting the toilet. Hand sanitiser is available in every classroom.
- Students should **not** wear school uniform. This follows Public Health England's advice that clothes should be washed every day to reduce the risk of transmission through the fabric. Clothes worn to school should be clean, comfortable and your body suitably covered
- We will provide students with the relevant stationary whilst they are in school so there is no need for anything to be brought in from home.
- Cleaning will take place twice a day.
- We expect all students to behave in a kind and considerate manner and follow protocol in these unprecedented times to keep themselves and others safe.

School Transport will also resume next week although it might be a different vehicle than the students are used to. In accordance with the government's guidance, we expect students to all wear suitable face coverings when travelling on school transport. Students must follow any instructions given to them by the bus drivers, particularly with regard to where they will be expected to sit.

Please do not attend or send your children to school if feeling unwell. Students should follow the "catch it, bin it, kill it advice" from NHS England that includes coughing into the elbow, disposing of tissues and always washing hands immediately.

We appreciate that you may have many questions and we thank you in advance for your patience and understanding. We hope that recent communications with you over the last few weeks should have answered any questions you have, but as always, please let us know if you have any urgent concerns through <u>office@tavistockcollege.org</u>.



The Secretary of State has mentioned that all pupils from all year groups will be back in full time education in September. This is another reminder to start preparing for this transition including uniforms. If you have any pre-loved uniforms please feel free to donate in wheelie bins outside the main gate. If you need any assistance please contact the college directly and finally Lawsons of Tavistock are ready for business to take new uniform orders.

CILIP Carnegie Medal and Kate Greenaway Award 2020

On 17th June, this year's winners of the Carnegie Medal and Kate Greenaway awards were announced: Lark by Anthony McGowan and Tales from the Inner City by Shaun Tan. Both books would make excellent choices for students' summer reading.

Although the Kate Greenaway medal is intended for children's writers (Aged 6 to 8) 'Tales from the Inner City', is a collection of 25 beautifully illustrated modern day parables, that have appeal for all ages. Shaun Tan is also the first BAME writer to have won the award in 60 years.

'Lark' by Anthony McGowan is a gentle but powerful tale about the unshakable bond between two brothers who find themselves lost on the moors. Both books help readers explore our relationship with nature and each other with stark simplicity - which is what Young Adult books and children's books do best. Everyone should read them.
