This week has seen a strict one way system around each

building, and more movement between lessons in order to prevent groups congregating. The way system has been a great success and the majority of students have adapted to the new routes around the college. We will continue to ensure we have separate year group entrances, ensure year groups have separate eating areas and maintain the use of face coverings in the circulation spaces.

From informal conversations with students they appreciate the movement breaks around the college and have experienced high quality teaching and learning in specialist classrooms. Their teachers have taken greater cleaning responsibilities during lesson changeovers, whilst being able to call upon their subject specific teaching and learning tools and resources to improve the teaching and learning within the classrooms for the students.

We know from the latest guidance that ventilation and hand sanitising are the greatest mitigating factors against the spread of the virus. This is why we have to fully ventilate the buildings (even though it is cold) and ask students to use the sanitiser provided.

If you son/ daughter were to test positive for COVID 19 it is essential that you contact the school immediately to allow us to follow public Health England advice. If this test was to happen outside of term time please email as a member of the senior leadership team will be on duty checking these emails. office@tavistockcollege.org

In the rare case of this happening you will be notified via school communication. It will either be one of two different emails in line with guidance from PHE: A general email telling you we have had a confirmed case. Or, an email telling you that your child needs to self isolate for 14 days because they were in direct contact. Below is the government advice

We recommend all schools ensure staff, parents and carers are aware of the following information and relevant arrangements regarding positive cases in the holidays:

- Where a pupil or staff member tests positive for coronavirus (COVID-19), having developed symptoms more than 48 hours since being in school, the school should not be contacted. Parents and carers should follow contact tracing instructions provided by NHS Test and Trace.
- For the first 6 days after teaching ends, if a pupil or staff member tests positive for coronavirus (COVID-19), having developed symptoms within 48 hours of being in school, the school is asked to assist in identifying close contacts and advising self-isolation, as the individual may have been infectious whilst in school.
- School staff are not asked to remain on-call or conduct any contact tracing more than 6 days after the final day of teaching. Where a schools last teaching day is on Friday 18 December, there should be no pupil contact tracing asks beyond Thursday 24 December.

For the first 6 days after the end of term, schools are not asked to be on-call at all times. Staff responsible for contact tracing may designate a limited period in the day to receive notification of positive cases and advise close contacts to self-isolate (this can be done by text or email). The Department for Education coronavirus (COVID-19) helpline and PHE advice service are available to support with any queries you have about positive cases in your school.

Where pupils are required to self-isolate due to contact with a positive case after the first 6 days following the end of term, schools do not need to be informed about their absence until the first day of the new term.

Remote Learning

As you are probably aware we now have a group of students that will receive their learning remotely. We have been expecting this and are fully prepared with our systems to support our students working from home. With these systems in place, Google Classroom, ClassCharts and various other platforms we can continue the learning and keep the communication channels open with our students and parents/carers.

There is a remote learning policy on our website and for the group of students who are now at home, they will be following stage 1.

I urge students who are self isolating to follow their timetable when completing work at home to ensure coverage of the curriculum. I am pleased to let you know that families will still receive their Free School Meals entitlement, during their isolation, where appropriate.

However, the internet is always changing, and being able to keep up to date with your children's use of technology can be a challenge.

You may sometimes feel that your children have better technical skills than you do, however children and young people still need advice and protection when it comes to managing their lives online.

Issues that your child may encounter on the internet will vary depending on their age and online activities. We have grouped potential online risks into these 4 categories.

- Conduct: children may be at risk because of their own behaviour, for example, by sharing too much information
- Content: age-inappropriate or unreliable content can be available to children
- Contact: children can be contacted by bullies or people who groom or seek to abuse them
- Commercialism: young people can be unaware of hidden costs and advertising in apps, games and websites
