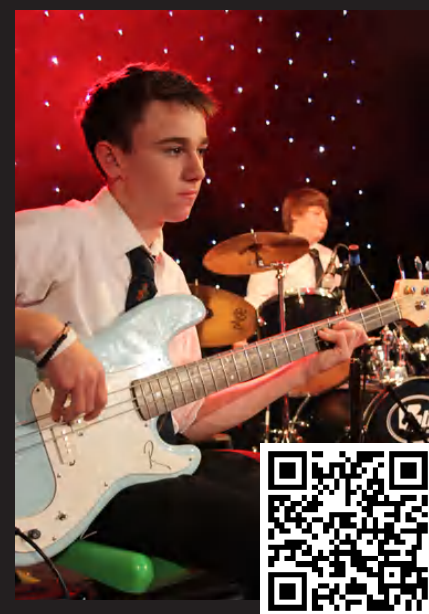
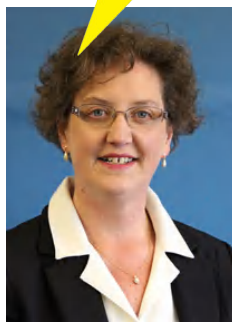
I am really excited to have the opportunity of being a Parent Governor for Tavistock College. With two sons at the school in Years 9 and 11, I am encouraged by the changes that

Tavistock College Students Win Headlight Competition

This is a national competition for which the students had to design a new car with the focus on brand, product and promotion.

Their luxury car which had the tag line "The Gent is Back" was a premium car designed to appeal to the wealthy male market. Their design included the use of technology to create a multimedia experience and gadgets such as a built in suit carrier and champagne chiller to ensure it appealed to their target audience.

Second place was won by Team Echo who designed an environmentally friendly hybrid for the modern woman. The judges were impressed with the unique range of gadgets included in this design especially the talking mirror!

The whole experience helped develop the students understanding of product design and allowed them to demonstrate the knowledge and skills they had learnt during their Business Studies lessons. Eco School Design Success at this year's Go4Set Awards

Congratulations to six of our Year 8 and 9 students who received the award for the most innovative design at this year's EDT Go4SET project which took place on Friday, 10th May.

Sponsored by Babcock Marine, the team worked closely with teacher, Mr Alex Jackson and Babcock mentors Mr Alex Hook and Miss Jen Walker to 'move' Tavistock College to an island of their choice and 'transform' it so that it was still a fully functioning school. To do this, the team had to research the College's needs, adapt existing solutions to island life and ultimately ensure that the College still functioned and worked in the ways it needed to. The students researched, planned, designed, discussed, wrote, read and modelled, and finally came up with a finished proposal: a school placed on the island Gili Trawangan in Indonesia, powered by a wind/wave generator and heated by a geothermal system that doubled as a desalination plant for fresh water, while also supplying power to the school.

The Judges were really impressed with their finished report and even want to use it as a model of good practice for next year!



Soapbox Derby Award

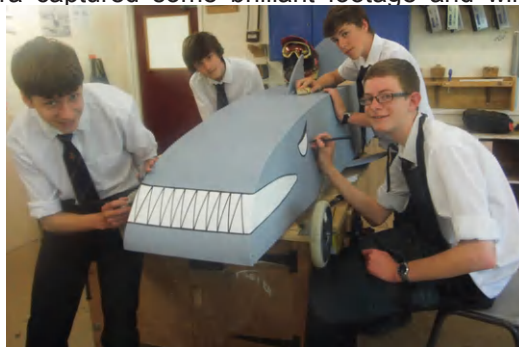
Through May and June four Y10 Resistant Materials students have been stretching their engineering skills by designing and constructing a Soapbox Derby Racer, ready for the big race day at the Buckland Village Summer Fair. Sam Rodgers, Will Dax, Joe Jordan and Josh Blake spent every lunch and break time as well as time after school to prepare the cart. They really wanted to focus on the aerodynamics and the completed cart really demonstrated this.



The carts were lined up in the village for their pre-race inspection the evening before the event and the judges went to work scrutinising the designs, inspecting the wide variety of steering mechanisms and breaking systems. There were six entries in all and a great deal of variety in design approach was evident. Our students were delighted when their vehicle was named as the 'Best Engineered Cart'! Sam happily collected the medal that he later mounted on the cart ready for the main event.

The race day arrived and the lads were so proud of what they had achieved. They wheeled their cart to the start line at the top of the Buckland Monachorum main street and for those of you who know it, this is one steep hill! The first run was to be driven by Mr Keegan who decided it was only right that a test dummy should be used first. Mr Keegan and Mr Deeves helped the students build the cart at school in the design and technology block. On the countdown of three the cart was released and quickly built speed. With the driving position only 5cm off the ground, the ride felt fast and smooth. The street was lined all the way down with spectators cheering the shark themed cart and driver on. At the bottom of the course after an eye watering decent the cart came to a nice controlled skidding stop with the breaks proving really effective.

Josh Blake drove as our under 17s entry, Josh had to make his decent after watching some pretty nasty crashes from some of the earlier descents, including his own brother Jason whose cart flipped twice in one run! Josh kept his head though and made a smooth run with a fast time and the crowd went wild as he flew under the chequered flag. We were so close to getting a spot on the podium but unfortunately our impressive time fell slightly short. The cart mounted video camera captured some brilliant footage and will help a new group of students next year to develop an even faster cart. Overall, the event and the build up to it were both inspiring and motivating, the students and other youngsters at the event now have an even stronger passion for design and technology.



Animal Hour



In recognition of consistent good conduct throughout their first year at Tavistock College, 38 students have been offered the opportunity for an 'Animal Hour'. The first group

completed their session, meeting Fleur the pony, Sheba the dog, the college guinea pigs and some bantam chicks. The purpose was to reward the students for their exemplary behaviour, at the same time teaching them how to care for and handle the different animals safely, along the way learning more about the evolution of the various species.

They were taught where the animals originated from, how they developed, how to care of them and what signs to look out for if the animal isn't well.'

Improving Literacy

Tavistock College recognised as a reading school

The following is an extract from an article published by the National Literacy Trust

"One of the first things a visitor to Tavistock College notices is the colourful notice at the receptionist's desk outlining the title and author of the book currently being read. This visual promotion is to be found throughout the corridors and on the classroom doors of the college providing a clear indication of how staff have embraced the school's current whole school initiative to promote reading and enhance all staff's skills to support all learners in their reading.

As James O'Connell, Assistant Principle, explains, "The link between reading, academic success and enhanced life chances is undeniable". He is leading projects which, whilst drawing on the skills and expertise of Liz Rowe, Head of English, Ann Morgan, Literacy Coordinator and Charlotte Meneer, Literacy Administrator, are remarkable in the fact that the school is concentrating on promoting an enthusiastic and enjoyable approach to reading and not just focusing on better test results.

Students and teachers all bring their own reading material to the classroom. Almost all students and all staff have recognised the power and importance of reading and an overwhelming majority are valuing this reading time. An important part of the scheme is that teachers are expected to read their own texts during this time. What has been generated and observed are a wealth of conversations about books. Students have even begun to compare and discuss not only what each other are reading but also what their teachers are reading. A number of weaker and more reluctant readers are becoming, voluntarily, regular readers. Also, several members of staff who are not English teachers and who have not previously 'taught reading' have been inspired to work directly with students with their reading, to become more skilled teachers of reading and, in two cases, to begin action research into reading."



Accelerated Reader

Since November all our Year 7 students have been taking part in the Accelerated Reader scheme during both Tutor time and English lessons. During this time we have had a number of occasions to celebrate the progress made by both individuals and groups.

As of the end of June, 15 students had read more than a million words on the scheme and received Millionaire badges and certificates; each week a cake is awarded to the tutor group making the greatest progress and Mrs Worrall has given out hundreds if not thousands of smaller prizes to students who have successfully completed a book quiz.

The final Year 7 assembly before the Easter holidays saw a number of students winning prizes including Easter eggs and gaining achievement certificates to celebrate their commitment and success on the Accelerated Reader scheme.

We are delighted to be able to announce that we have recently received sponsorship from the Lions Club which will enable us to recognise our most committed readers through the opportunity to win a Kindle along with a £10 gift voucher enabling the purchase of e-books; this prize will be awarded termly giving students 3 opportunities to win across the academic year.

I am delighted by how enthusiastically Year 7 have embraced the reading initiatives and opportunities on offer here at the College and I look forward to celebrating many more reading achievements as they move into Year 8. *Ann Morgan, Literacy Coordinator*

Tavistock College hosted the Carnegie Shadowing Event this year, welcoming 6 other schools to join them in this celebration of literature for children and young people. On Wednesday 19th June, the 7 schools from Plymouth and Cornwall represented and championed different shortlisted texts in an enjoyable day to celebrate our love of reading. Author Ally Kennen also attended the event, giving an inspiring talk about her writing and her ‘top 23 books to read before you hit sixteen’.

As hosts, the students from our College had a very busy day – not only did they have a



presentation to perform in front of the gathered students and teachers, but they also had to welcome our guests and support the catering staff and booksellers. The College was well-represented by the delightful manners of Charlie Lowe and Kate Mugridge-Guest, who served refreshments. Weng Vooi helped organise arriving buses, score-keeping and generally making sure our team was ready to present! Ryan Maloney and Molly Bolding provided technical support.

The Tavistock College Carnegie ‘crew’ was assigned the title *Wonder* by R J Palacio to represent this year. This is an emotional and heart-warming story and a boy who grows up with facial disfigurement and is about to start middle school for the first time. Supported by Miss Jenny Strongman, their English teacher, the team shaped their presentation into a special edition of the panel show *Would I lie to you?* communicating key ideas from the text in a unique way. The College was represented in this presentation by the talents of: Weng Cheng Vooi, Grace Kelly, Jazz Rice (all year 10); Vicky Scawn, Sophie Manton, Clarissa Mears, Molly Bolding, Amy Stephens, Ezra Rickman, Katelyn Goodbourn and Siobhan Mackie (all year 8) and Amy Eaton (year 7).

What did the students have to say? Ryan: “The day was a fun-filled event with a social and relaxed atmosphere. We could clearly see everyone having a wonderful time with lots of schools interacting with each other.” Molly: “My favourite bit was meeting the author Ally Kennen, who signed my books and has inspired me to continue my writing, giving me lots of helpful advice.” Weng: “It was great to watch their performances which made me want to read some of the other Carnegie books.” Jazz: “Pure awesomeness!”

The event itself was organised by Mrs Kathy Worrall, the College librarian, who enjoyed that a special, enjoyable day was had by all, with many staff and students keen to be involved next year too. Callington College won with their presentation on *A Boy, a Bear and a Boat*, which included a drama sketch, ukulele playing and a recorded interview with the author of their book, Dave Shelton.



Book Bistro



The year 7 focus on reading has taken many forms, including the Accelerated reader scheme, community mentors and “drop everything and read sessions.” Some classes have also enjoyed, a “Book Bistro” These were lessons based on an American idea of allowing students to talk about their favourite book in an informal, non judgemental setting. Classrooms were transformed by the students into cafe/ coffee shop style settings with desks covered in tablecloths, scones and cream,

tea and juice and students contributed home baked buns and flowers for table decorations. While soft music played students talked to others about their favourite book and read sections to each other.

Everyone felt the Book Bistro was an excellent way to share book recommendations and allow everyone to share why their own book was special and important to them. In an evaluation students made positive comments which ranged from “I felt proud to be able to talk about my book” .to “ I really want to read some of the books we talked about.” They have many plans to improve the Book Bistro to lead to even more discussion. The classes will now compile a list of their recommended books with Michael Morpurgo’s “Farm Boy” a firm favourite following an enthusiastic discussion of this sequel to “War Horse.”

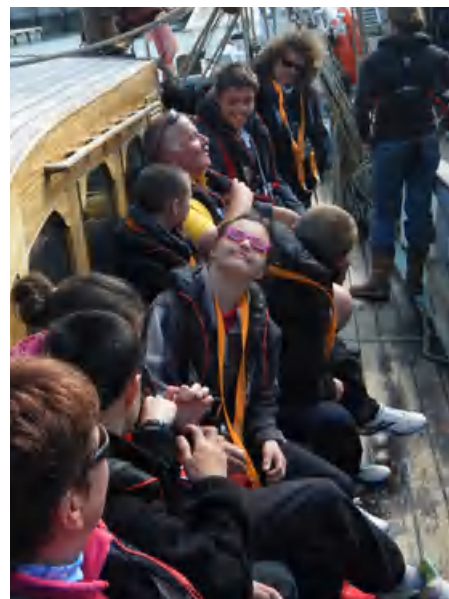
Tall Ship Expeditions



Tavistock Tall Ships organisation was formed in 2006, following 3 years of successful sail training programmes run via Devon Curriculum Services. It's main objective is to provide opportunities for young people, supported by adults, to develop skills and maintain an interest in traditional sailing vessels whilst retaining sailing skills and techniques which have been passed down through generations.

The group activities are directed by a management committee, which raises funds and applies for bursaries in order to subsidise expeditions.

Since its formation 'Tavistock Tall Ships' has supported hundreds of young people, and to date the training team on the committee have been involved with a total of 36 Tall Ship Expeditions involving young people from Tavistock and the rural West Devon district. Working closely with Trinity Sailing



Foundation, an excellent sail training organisation based in South Devon which owns four superb traditional vessels; the associated Sailing Trust has generously awarded sailing bursaries in recent years, these have subsidised students aged 12 - 19 years, mostly attending Tavistock College.

Expeditions usually take place during the months of May through to October.

Students receive a personalised voyage certificate upon completion and also have the opportunity to train for a Royal Yachting Association internationally recognised and certificated course during their expedition. Tavistock Tall Ships currently has a 100 percent pass rate for all 'start yachting' and 'competent crew' RYA courses taken.

Learning and Achievement Evening

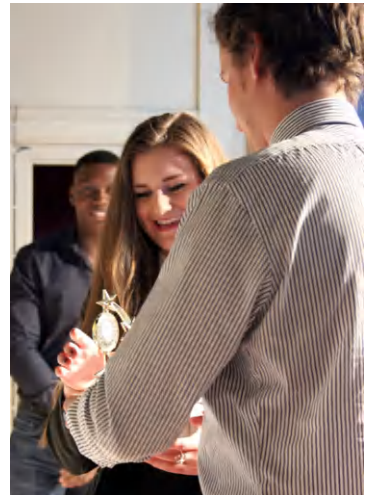

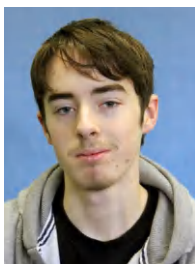

In 5 years... Either studying for a masters in Japanese or Russian or maybe starting a career with the diplomatic service.

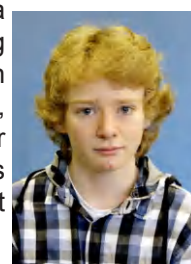

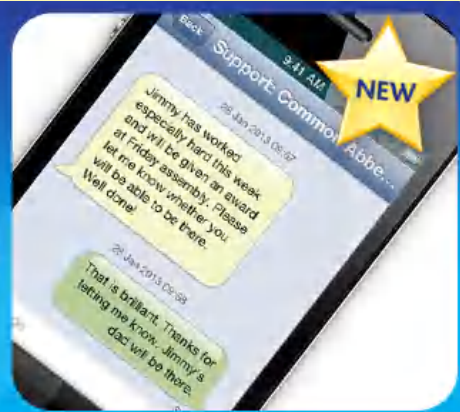

Free School Meals

Parents/Carers receiving the following support payments are entitled to apply for Free School Meals:

- Income Support (IS)
- Employment Support Allowance (Income Related)
- Child Tax Credit without Working Tax Credit with an annual taxable income (as assessed by HMR&C) of less than £16,190
- Income-based Job Seekers Allowance (IBJSA)
- Guaranteed Element of State Pension Credit.
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999

If a child is in receipt of FSM in Primary school this will automatically continue into Secondary school.

Parents / Carers applying for free school meals will, in most cases, no longer need to provide paper proof of qualifying benefits. All enquiries should be directed to Devon County Council who now check eligibility through a Department for Children, Schools and Families hub for all applications. In order to perform a hub check you need to contact Devon County Council, by either telephoning on 0845 155 1019, or via email on freeschoolmeals@devon.gov.uk providing parent/carer surname, date of birth and National Insurance number. It is still your responsibility to let us know if your circumstances change and your child is no longer eligible for Free School Meals.

Although the College will no longer be directly involved in the application process we are always happy to offer any help with the application should you need it, so please do not hesitate to ask. The school receives additional funding for each student in receipt of Free School Meals through the Pupil Premium Grant which can be used to provide additional support where necessary. See our Pupil Premium Guarantee on the College website for more details.
