Curriculum consultation:

We are seeking your views as part of a consultation into the organisation of the curriculum at Tavistock College.

We currently run key stage 3 over two years (Y7 and Y8) and begin key stage 4 in Y9 following an options process. The proposal is to change this to a three year key stage 3 (Y7, Y8 and Y9) and to run GCSE courses over two years only (Y10 and Y11).

The benefit of the current curriculum model is that students are able to choose 4 options. By shortening key stage 3 by one year, we can offer a broader range of subjects. This enables students to have more choice for KS5. The curriculum structure enables us to include specialist subjects such as Creative Media and vocational courses such as Construction, alongside the more traditional, academic subjects. This model also means that subjects can be taught in depth.

The problem with the current model is that students stop learning some subjects a year earlier, and, whilst we certainly plan to cover the key stage three expectations, the depth of learning is not in place for subjects that students choose not to take forward to GCSE. For example,40% - 50% of students do not continue with a language after Y8 in the current model. In addition, some parents feel that Y8 is too early to make choices for GCSE subjects.

Devon Climate Emergency

"Temperature rise to date has already resulted in profound alterations to human and natural systems, including increases in droughts, floods, and some other types of extreme weather; sea level rise; and biodiversity loss – these changes are causing unprecedented risks to vulnerable persons and populations." IPCC (2018) Special Report: Global Warming of 1.5 °C

The Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) has advised that carbon emissions must reduce globally by at least 45% by 2030 from 2010 levels. There is a chance we can avoid the worst effects of climate change by keeping warming below 1.5 degrees. To achieve this we must be carbon neutral (net-zero) by 2050 or earlier.

In response, a range of public, private and voluntary organisations from across Devon came together on 22 May 2019, to declare a climate emergency and to endorse the principles of the Devon Climate Declaration. They have appointed a Net-Zero Task Force to produce a Devon Carbon Plan. You can read more on the Devon Climate Emergency website. https://www.devonclimateemergency.org.uk/

Devon Carbon Plan process is launched – residents called on to give their ideas

A top team of environmental experts, charged with ensuring that Devon reduces carbon emissions as quickly as possible, is calling on residents to submit their ideas on how to do it.

The Net-Zero Task Force has been appointed by the Devon Climate Emergency Response Group – made up of Devon's councils, emergency services and business groups – to deliver the Devon Carbon Plan.

The Carbon Plan will lay out in stark terms what every resident, organisation and business has to do to reduce emissions and safeguard the planet for the next generation.

This Call for Evidence is open to everybody, and every submission will be reviewed by the Task Force.

Submissions will feed into the creation of the Carbon Plan, which includes a series of thematic hearings in November and December.

Each hearing will focus on the different parts of our society that produce most of the emissions, like transport for instance.

Recent data compiled by Exeter University show that homes and buildings, road transport, and farming account for 83% of all emissions in Devon, Plymouth and Torbay.

The hearings will seek to understand what needs to happen to achieve rapid decarbonisation in Devon, and how it can be delivered.

The hearings will be divided into:

- food, land and sea (including agriculture, forestry, fisheries and land use)
- mobility and transport
- the built environment
- · energy and waste

A draft of the Devon Carbon Plan will be created through a threestep process; firstly, Task Force members and expert witnesses, all recognised in their respective fields, will discuss and then review the evidence.

Then the Task Force will present a series of 'options' to a Citizen's Assembly, which will be convened from January.

Finally, the deliberations of the Citizen's Assembly will lead to the Draft Devon Carbon Plan, which is due for publication next spring, 2020.

Over the next three days we visited many places of interest such as Trenches, Tunnels and Museums and, of

course, Battlefields from the Somme to Passchendale, along with Vimy Ridge. There were many other thought-provoking visits such as Thiepval Memorial and the Memorial at Vimy Ridge. We also got to visit Poperinge

where the infamous shooting post is situated where all the soldiers deemed to be cowards were shot at dawn.

During the Wednesday afternoon we took time out to visit the famous chocolate store in the middle of Ypres where staff and students were able to have a chocolate experience, a little R and R so to speak.

Wednesday evening was very special as we went to the Menin Gate ceremony and Tavistock College were represented by four pupils (Caitlyn Lynch, James Crossey, Emily Hutchinson and Joshua Brownlow) who had a special honour of laying a wreath for the fallen soldiers of the Tavistock area. It goes without saying, they did Tavistock and the college proud.

Tuesday and Thursday evening they worked hard on their individual scrapbooks recording what they had done and where they had visited over the experiences of the last few days.



We then took a boat to Murano where we had the opportunity to experience glass blowing demonstrations.

The final day was filled with sombre, all of us knowing it would be a long time before the delicious Italian food would be in our reach again.
